My Spiritual Life: How Do I Pray?

Key Verses: Matthew 6:5-15

- God cares about the desires of our hearts. He wants us to pray to Him about everything in our lives. Praying daily will help us grow closer to Him. Prayer is not about a formal conversation, but a time spent talking with God and listening for God to respond.
- Prayer is just like having a conversation; it has different facets or parts. Prayer includes asking for
 forgiveness, asking for help with needs, asking for help from temptation, and praying and yielding to
 the Father. Prayer can also include telling God how you feel and what you are experiencing. In other
 words, prayer is a normal, everyday conversation with God. This week discuss with your family the

 things.

BIBLE STORY: Isaiah, Prophet to Judah; Isaiah 6-7

Big Picture Question: Why did God call Isaiah? God called Isaiah to warn His people and promise them Jesus would one day come to be "God with us."

- Through the prophet Isaiah, God promised to send Immanuel, which means "God with us." Jesus fulfilled this promise when He came to earth and was born of a virgin. Jesus is our Immanuel, God with us.
- Isaiah and other prophets often had to tell powerful people hard messages from God. They could speak with confidence because they were speaking words from God. Practice at home greeting one another with confidence. Stand tall, make eye contact, smile, introduce yourself clearly, and shake hands firmly. Next time you go to church, think of someone you don't know well and greet that person with a smile, hello, eye contact. List the names of people you greeted!

BIBLE STORY: Isaiah, Prophet to Judah; Isaiah 6-7

Big Picture Question: Why did God call Isaiah? God called Isaiah to warn His people.

- Isaiah knew he was sinful and shouldn't be with God. God is holy. God forgave Isaiah's sin. God had a plan to send His Son, Jesus, to die for our sins. We must trust in Him. When we trust in Jesus, we answer like Isaiah: "Here I am. Send me."
- Roast hot dogs or make s'mores over a fire. Talk about using fire (or heat) to purify, giving these examples: Washing dishes in hot, soapy water lifts grease away faster than washing in cold, soapy water, and doctors sterilize instruments at high temperatures. In Isaiah's vision, a seraph (a winged creature) touched Isaiah's lips with a burning coal. This was a picture of cleansing his lips so Isaiah could tell messages from God. We are cleansed by trusting in Jesus. Take a picture of your family making hot dogs or s'mores.
